WILDLIFE WATCH

Lots of reports of birds this month. Blackbirds seen in gardens in Berwick (still none in mine), two Green Woodpeckers on the lawn in the frost in a village garden, a heron in the hedgerow behind the Guides, and several Egrets seen many times in the same field.

8 Red Kites circling over the same field in early January, and several Kites seen regularly around the large tree opposite the houses at Uppington. A white rumped bird of prey seen flying – probably a female Hen Harrier. Also a Sandpiper by the Mill in Berwick.

There are lots of berries in the hedgerows attracting the winter migratory birds; Fieldfares and Redwings seen up Langford Way. A Mistle Thrush was heard in Winterbourne Stoke after Christmas.

STONE CURLEWS

I have had the Wessex Stone-Curlew report for 2025. It covers Wiltshire, Hampshire, Berkshire, Oxfordshire and South Downs but the majority are in Wiltshire. Total of 130 pairs, of which 97 were recording breeding (94 pairs in Wiltshire, 69 pairs proved to breed). 75 successfully fledged chicks. 72% of all breeding attempts were on specially created plots as part of agri-environmental schemes (including in Berwick parish). 16 interventions were made where birds which had attempted to nest in unsafe habitats, and, of those 7 chicks fledged.

The roost count for Wiltshire, Hampshire and Berkshire made on 15th Sept had a total of 354 birds. The RSPB would like to say a huge thank you to the many farmers, landowners and tractor drivers that have done their upmost to safe-guard stone-curlew nesting attempts in Wessex. Nicky Street.

OTHER WILDLIFE NEWS

The cold snap we had over the Christmas period seemed to have brought flocks of Fieldfares and Redwings, winter thrushes from Scandinavia, Russia and Iceland that feast on our hedgerow berries. From a distance they don't look that attractive but close up they really are strikingly beautiful birds. Redwings with their yellow / white eye-stripe and a flash of red under the wing; Fieldfares with their blue-grey heads, chestnut back, heavily streaked breast and pale grey rump. Hopefully they will be with us for a few more months.

Over the past month I've regularly been seeing an immature White-Tailed Eagle which almost like clockwork tends to show up just before sunset slowly flapping high up over Great Wishford as it makes its way towards Grovely Wood. Mike Stoneman, Great Wishford

BENEFICE LETTER FEBRUARY 2026

Dear Friends,

As I write this letter, we are in the midst of Epiphany Season, the revelation of Christ shining out to all peoples and nations, the fulfilment of both Advent promises and the joys of Christmas. Time moves on. At Candlemas, Christmas Season formally ends and we pivot our gaze from the manger to the Cross. On Wednesday 18th February we mark our foreheads with Ash and begin our Lenten Pilgrimage.

*The Lord has compassion on those who fear him;
for he knows how we are formed, he remembers that we are dust.*

Love, compassion, and remembering are qualities which mark out our humanity, our relationship with others.

There are moments when life asks us to step back, to remember and reflect on where we have come from and where we think life is taking us. Lent, I believe, is such a moment, one of those thoughtful seasons of life, where we might set aside the hurly-burly of daily living, and intentionally remember, reflect and seek a different way.

Lent is always about remembering and, on one level, we may 'give up' chocolate or wine or even fast one day a week to help us remember that Lent is a special time. But what are we remembering?

Lent is the time to remember the love of God graciously poured out through Christ Jesus for each one of us. A moment to remember Jesus, human, faultless, unbroken, yet cruelly executed on the Cross by other humans. Lent is the season to remember that Jesus died so that we might have new life in all its possibilities. We remember Jesus' action, love divine, all love excelling. Lent is also the time when we try to grasp the immensity of compassion, that potentially overwhelming aspect of love and remembering. Compassion is rooted in the profound human emotion of "suffering with" ~ suffering with our loved ones, neighbours, friends, with all who suffer this day in the world. Compassion, like love, is a call to do something. The Passion of Christ is Jesus lovingly, intentionally, suffering for all of us, so that we might be freed from the darknesses of our lives. Compassion is our remembering Jesus' love and

suffering, before on Easter Sunday, we celebrate the joy of Jesus' glorious resurrection and the freedom we are graced as we stand at the empty tomb.

Lent, then, is a season which has much to give to us. So, I hope we can all take just a little time and to make just a little effort to open our hearts and minds to the love which knows no bounds and is always there for us regardless.

LOCAL HISTORY – DRUID'S LODGE CONFEDERACY

At our Christmas Book Club we had a "Secret Santa" and one of the books was "The Druid's Lodge Confederacy" by Paul Mathiue. This is a fascinating story well worth reading. Several villagers hadn't heard about it, so I thought it would be interesting to put it in the magazine again.

In 1895 Druid's Lodge and the buildings were purpose built as a Racing Stable, where previously there had only been The Druid's Head public house. Wilfred Purefoy, A P Cunliffe (who owned the land around, and bought Asserton in 1909) Frank Forester, Edward Wigan and Holmer Peard with their trainer Jack Fallon, spent over £2 ½ million pounds setting up the perfect place to train racehorses in absolute secrecy. Although the partners wanted winners, and had a good many including several of the Classic races, they really made the business work through betting on their own horses, and winning a great deal of money. Sometimes their methods of getting a very low handicap for a good horse was fairly close to being illegal, - and their methods

of betting large sums of money made the bookmakers change many of their rules.

Hacklers Pride won the Cambridgeshire and is reputed to have won the syndicate over £10 million pounds at 1990 values. That was just one race! In 1907 after many successful seasons Jack Fallon left to train at his own stables – Scotland Lodge at Winterbourne Stoke.

In 1913 the Druid's Lodge trained Aboyeur won the Derby, the race in which the Suffragette Emily Davidson was killed by the King's horse Anmer. During the 1914-18 Great War all the land and buildings were requisitioned. Afterwards Cunliffe patched up the gallops but nothing was the same again. The stables were shut for several years before Cunliffe sold the estate to J V Rank in 1934. In 1935 Noel Cannon became the flat race trainer for J V Rank at a refurbished Druids Lodge.

FAREWELL TO REVEREND LOUISA HALLIDAY

Louisa, an only child, was born in Cornwall where her mother Susanna was a GP; her uncle went to farm in New Zealand and had a family there who were a big part of Louisa's life. In 1963 Louisa registered as a nurse in Bristol, and after a period as a health visitor, became a very popular tutor on the Salisbury Midwifery. When the midwifery training changed and Odstock midwifery school closed, Louisa helped set up the degree course in Bournemouth.

In Great Wishford, there was always tremendous hospitality on offer at Station House, which over the years became a sanctuary to many needing relief from varying circumstances. Along with Alana, Louisa regularly hosted church home groups, welcomed new arrivals in the village, organised village breakfasts, Lent lunches, started the duck race, re-establishing carol singing around the village and other events open to all - in part as fund raising for the church or a particular charity. Louisa loved her dogs, particularly labradors,

and enjoyed walking in the countryside around Wishford. Likewise, her garden and swimming pool were always a joy to Louisa.

Louisa was very supportive of the village school as a governor and was involved with many of the activities including 'open the book'. Louisa served on the Parish Council until 2017.

After Louisa retired from her post as lecturer she sought a vocation in the ministry, where her wisdom, thoughtfulness and compassion were much admired. Louisa was pastorally minded to her finger tips as demonstrated in her well-crafted homilies and prayers.

Louisa's funeral was held on Friday 16th January in a packed St Giles' Church, a sign, if any were needed, of the love and affection in which Louisa was held by so many. Louisa is buried up in the churchyard extension two plots away from her mother, Susanna. May Louisa rest in peace and rise in glory.

CHRISTMAS AT ST MARY'S

It was a busy Christmas in Stapleford. Two weeks before Christmas a large chunk of plaster fell from the ceiling and emergency work was carried out to make the whole surrounding area safe, distributing plaster dust generously over every inch of the building. PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Parish Council has maintained contact with National Highways regarding the A303. The contractor-led survey continues on the road through Winterbourne Stoke to Amesbury. An offer has been made to host a meeting with the contractors to explain the impact of the traffic on the village. The National Highways' Route Manager has agreed to come to speak to a public meeting in the village in May or June to explain the outcomes. He has also agreed to remove the surplus temporary road signs and traffic cones that are littering the grass verges.

A number of residents have expressed concerns about Wiltshire Council's "Revamp Your Tank" project designed to provide fully-funded grants to replace ageing septic tanks with sewage treatment plants to improve the river water quality. Residents whose gardens about the river have heard nothing. Those who live slightly further away have been told that either they need to make a financial contribution or that, as their location is not deemed to be connected to the river via either surface or groundwater, they are no longer eligible for funding. All the houses involved have had site surveys completed and it would seem that the goal posts have been moved. The Parish Council has contacted the project team and invited them to attend the village to explain what further analysis and mapping, to which they refer, has led to these changes.

Wiltshire Council leads an Expert and Stakeholder Group for the Stonehenge and Avebury World Heritage Partnership of 25 groups, including English Heritage and the National Trust, to manage and protect the unique landscapes. The Parish Council receives updates. Recently the Group has circulated a paper for comment setting out its Vision and Strategic Goals. The Parish Council has responded that the Expert and Stakeholder Group should seek to reunify the north and south of the Stonehenge WHS currently bisected by the A303; to work constructively with National Highways to alleviate traffic issues within the WHS that detract from the otherwise outstanding landscape of cultural significance; and should seek to contribute to resolving the traffic issues that mar the Stonehenge WHS.

Finally, the slide in the playpark that had broken has now been replaced. The initial quote for the work was just under £8,000. Sarah, our Parish Clerk, found another contractor using her contacts, and the work has been completed for £2,800. Thank you, Sarah, a great start to the Parish Council's new year.
